



#### Threats:

- Being the only aided college in the area, it becomes unable to meet the demand for admission as the number of courses are much less in number comparing with the number of applicants. The Govt. only can solve the issue by sanctioning the new courses already applied for by the college.
- The people of the area belong mainly to low or middle class on income basis. Hence the lack of interest in studies by many students belong to such families create challenges to achieve better results.
- The low socio-economic profile of the people causes admission of students to the college with low marks. Making them interested in studies forms a great challenge.
